

## Accountability, Transparency and Access to Information International Council on Archives Annual Conference Brussels, 23<sup>rd</sup> – 24<sup>th</sup> November 2013 Preliminary Programme (October 2013)

## Introduction

The 2013 Annual Conference of the International Council on Archives is the first annual conference open to all to consist of all members, as reflected in the 2012 Constitution voted in by the Annual General Meeting in Brisbane, Australia. This, together with the open call for papers, reflects the findings of the 2010 CITRA Review Report as to the wishes of members. In spite of the short submission period, members of the ICA network have responded incredibly positively with proposals for single presentations and panel sessions for the conference on the records management (another first for ICA) themes of accountability, transparency and access. We received 110 submissions from almost every region of the network – and many submissions proposed panels of more than two speakers. The response, in terms both of quantity and quality, was overwhelming,

The Programme Committee assessed all of the proposals except a few of the late ones, which were reviewed by the VP Finance and the DSG Conferences. In order to accommodate as many speakers as possible the decision was made to accept proposed panels as single presentations, perhaps with two speakers. The result is a very full programme and there will be a need for strong chairmanship. We also sacrificed the option of a second keynote speaker session on the second day in favour of a parallel session which would allow for more speakers.

The keynote speakers represent ICA's partnership organisations, ARMA, to reflect the records management themes in the programme and IRMT which also reflect recent collaboration on Open Government initiatives. There is a key note speaker from the Transparency Directorate of the Council of the European Union and the Belgian Information Commissioner has also agreed to speak.

The pleasing aspect is that the successful proposals fitted quite naturally into a number of strands around the main subject and themes of the original call. We therefore have a strong first parallel session in the main auditorium following the keynote addresses on open government and open data. We have two sessions on records management challenges and approaches. Truth and reconciliation attracted a number of proposals and there are to be two session devoted to this subject. We also have four linked sessions around access to information, data protection and the legal issues and tensions associated with them for archivists and records managers. There are two sessions on the role of archivists and records managers with respect to the conference themes. There are also two sessions on citizens' engagement with government, archives and history. Finally there is an ICA programme showcase session where members can hear about the Programme Commission's products and achievements. There will also be an ICA update session where the elected officers, the FAN, FIDA and the Secretariat can brief participants on key issues and progress.

The Programme Committee have tried to bring together presentations from all over the world, to hear from practitioners from all walks of the archives and records management field to include academics, national archives workers, private archives, associations, consultants and pressure groups. The result is a varied yet coherent programme with something for everyone. We hope that ICA members will continue to endorse the new format as well as agree that the programme for the 2013 Annual Conference is interesting and vibrant and the conference is not to be missed.
